SAKURA IN CHICAGO: 120 YEARS OF US-JAPAN RELATIONS

Since the 1893 Columbian Exposition, Chicago has maintained The Garden of the Phoenix in Jackson Park, as a place where visitors can learn about Japan and experience Japanese culture, opening the doors for vibrant economic, political, and cultural exchange. 120 years later, the garden is an enduring symbol of collaboration and diplomacy between Chicago and Japan. Kulapat Yantrasast is the cofounder and principal of wHY Architecture which began in 2003. In 2007, wHY completed the Grand Rapids Art Museum in Michigan, which became the first new LEED Gold museum in the world. Current projects include the expansion and renovation of the Speed Art Museum in Louisville, Kentucky and a series of gallery design and collection installations at the Harvard Art Museum. Prior to wHY Architecture, he worked closely with Tadao Ando, as a project

architect on the Modern Art Museum of Fort Worth and the ARMANI/TEATRO in Milan, among others. He was the first architect to be awarded the Silpathorn Award from the Government of Thailand in 2009. In 2012, he was named one of the 100 Most Powerful People in the Art World by Art+Auction. He received his degree in architecture from Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok, Thailand, and his Masters and PhD from the University of Tokvo.

Robert W. Karr, Jr. (moderator) is a principal at law firm of Masuda Funai, and author of "The Garden of the Phoenix," published this spring in the North American Japanese Garden Association Annual Journal. Karr has studied and worked extensively in Japan, and currently serves on the boards of The Japan America Society of Chicago and The Garden of the Phoenix Foundation.
