2022 MEXT Undergraduate Scholarship

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS Consulate-General of Japan in Chicago

Please note that due to the COVID-19 Pandemic, in some circumstances such as travel restrictions or curfews, there are possibilities that the selection process will be canceled, or applicants will not be able to depart to Japan even after being selected as scholarship students.

1.) What is the MEXT Undergraduate Scholarship?

The Ministry of Education, Culture Sports, Science, and Technology (MEXT; Monbukagakusho) Undergraduate Scholarship is a Japanese government scholarship that allows non-Japanese citizens to spend up to 5 years pursuing their undergraduate education at a university in Japan. Scholarship recipients are expected to graduate with a bachelor's degree from their university in Japan.

2.) What are the benefits?

MEXT will provide roundtrip airfare to Japan, full tuition and any university entrance fees, along with a monthly stipend of ¥117,000. An additional ¥2,000 - ¥3,000 monthly stipend may be provided to those students studying in designated regions. (As of 2021 Japanese fiscal year; the amount of stipend is subject to change).

3.) Who is eligible to apply?

To apply through the Consulate-General of Japan in Chicago, applicants must (a) Be a United States citizen (b) Been born on or after April 2,1997 (c) Have completed 12-year regular education course by March 2022 (d) Be a resident of a state in the Chicago Consulate's 10state Midwest jurisdiction [Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, South Dakota, Wisconsin]. 4.) I am not a U.S. citizen/ resident of a state in the Chicago Consulate's 10-state jurisdiction? Can I still apply?

You can still apply for the MEXT Scholarship, but you will need to do so through the Japanese diplomatic mission responsible for your country/area. To find your nearest Embassy/Consulate-General/Consular Office, please see this link: http://www.mofa.go.jp/about/emb_cons/mofaserv.html

5.) What is the application timeline?

Applications will be posted on our MEXT Scholarship website in April; <u>applications are due</u> <u>Monday, June 7, 2021</u>. Those selected to have an interview and exams will sit for the exams at the Japanese Consulate in Chicago on <u>Thursday, June 24, 2021</u>; interviews will be conducted remotely on <u>Friday, June 25, 2021 (tentative)</u>. Consulate recommendations (in coordination with the Embassy of Japan in Washington, DC) will be announced later. Secondary screening will then be conducted by MEXT in November. Final decisions will come by the end of January 2022. Scholarship recipients must then depart for Japan in early April 2022 (specific departure dates are determined by the technical college you will attend).

Upon arrival in Japan, Scholarship recipients will undergo a 1-year preparatory education course before beginning their undergraduate studies at a Japanese university, unless they choose direct placement.

6.) How do I fill out the Academic Background (Section #10) section?

List your entire academic career from kindergarten and/or first grade through your current or most recent academic year. Please include extended breaks (such as summer breaks) in the academic year. See the example chart at the end of this document.

7.) What is the Preparatory Education?

Each grantee will be enrolled at a preparatory school (either Tokyo University of Foreign Studies or Osaka University) designated by MEXT for a one-year intensive course in the Japanese language and other subjects necessary for preparation for proceeding to the university. Grantees will then take entrance exams for their designated university. If the grantee does not pass the entrance exams, or is determined incapable of completing the prescribed course at the preparatory school, the grantee will not be allowed to proceed to university. 8.) What is Direct Placement?

Direct Placement is the system whereby the requirement for preparatory education is waived and direct admission to a university is permitted, if you have sufficient knowledge of Japanese language and there is no necessity for preparatory education, or if you wish to enter a university course that has no Japanese language requirement. Please see Guideline #4 for more information.

9.) Can I choose what university I can attend?

Applicants who apply via Direct Placement will need to submit the Placement Preference Form, in which they name up to 3 Japanese universities and academic departments (aka faculty) you wish to join. However, final selection decision will be made by MEXT.

Applicants who do not apply via Direct Placement do not need to choose which university and academic department (aka faculty) they wish to join at the time of application. However, the Consulate-General of Japan in Chicago recommends that you research your options. Upon completion of the preparatory education (see Question #7), a Scholarship grantee will take the entrance examination of the university designated by MEXT in consultation with the university and the preparatory school.

10.) I live abroad. Can I apply for the MEXT Scholarship?

You can apply for the MEXT Scholarship from abroad. In general, if selected for an interview and exams, you MUST return to the United States to take the exams at the Consulate-General of Japan in Chicago on the designated day.

11.) Can I interview and take the exams online?

Interviews will be held remotely via Zoom or a similar platform. However, exams must be taken in person at the Consulate-General of Japan in Chicago on the designated day.

12.) What exams must be taken for the Undergraduate Scholarship?

Applicants intending to major in the Social Sciences or Humanities must take (1) Japanese Language exam (2) English Language exam (3) Mathematics exam. Applicants intending to major in Natural Sciences must take (1) Japanese Language exam (2) English Language exam (3) Mathematics exam (4) Chemistry exam and (5) Either Biology or Physics exam.

13.) Do I need to know Japanese to get the scholarship?

MEXT does not require proficiency in the Japanese language at the time of applying. However, applicants must show a willingness to learn the language and deepen their understanding of Japan before and after their arrival. In general, applicants must be willing to receive their college education in Japanese.

14.) Can I have my application materials returned to me?

Unfortunately, no. Once application materials have been submitted to us at the Consulate-General of Japan in Chicago, they cannot be returned under any circumstances. We encourage you to make copies of all your application materials.

15.) How many copies of the application materials do I need to submit?

Please see Guideline #10 for more information about the required materials and how many originals vs. copies we require of each document. Please note that we need 1 original Application Form with 1 original photograph of you attached, and with an original signature. We also need 1 photocopy of each original document submitted.

16.) Where do I mail my application?
